Academic Development

Developing study materials adapted to distance teaching is the apex of the OUI academic endeavor. The development process is lengthy, complex and demanding. Involved in this endeavor are OUI personnel – faculty members and editors with knowledge and experience in preparing material for independent study, together with academics from other universities, who are experts in the field.

The OUI's classic textbooks are the essence of OUI activity. They constitute the basic study materials used by OUI students, and are well-known and popular with students and lecturers at all universities in Israel. An OUI textbook in its classic format replaces the traditional face-to-face course and exercise format and is learner-friendly. The text and the illustrations conduct a dialog with the learner by including thought-provoking questions, exercises and answers, summary questions on various levels of difficulty, as well as interim and integrated summaries of discussions and other didactic aids. Hence the OUI motto, "the book is the teacher." In intermediate level courses, the text is usually written specifically for the OUI, whereas advanced course textbooks are for the most part collections of articles for guided reading accompanied by explanations.

The number of courses available to students in innovative formats has grown in recent years. In addition to the written material, some of these include courseware or video-recorded lessons on CD as well as links to relevant websites. In the last year, various models of filmed courses have been developed; among them, courses primarily based on recorded lectures that are combined with a study guide and additional reading materials, or courses in which the filmed lectures replace the study guide, and are accompanied by additional reading materials.

To ensure that the books remain up-to-date and to maintain their high academic quality, this year the OUI continued to give top priority to updating and replacing outdated courses. At the same time, we are developing new courses for the latest undergraduate and graduate degree programs approved by the CHE.

The large number of courses and the wide range of formats necessitated mapping all the study materials and creating a database according to criteria determined for evaluating courses and programs of study. All the data in the various OUI databases was combined into one database, and in the future, all new materials that are developed will be catalogued in this database.

The scope of academic development activity has long necessitated computerization of the development process. Steps were taken this year in this direction.

Translating Courses into Arabic

This year, following the recommendations of the Dotan Committee, we began the translation of three introductory courses into Arabic. All the books in "The Middle East Between the World Wars" have been translated and a provisional edition of the course is expected to be published this year. In "Introduction to the Social Sciences," the translation of the text of four books has been completed and a fifth will be completed shortly. In "Educational Psychology," the textbook has been translated and translation of the reader is under way.

English as a Foreign Language

Development of updated materials for the A-level reading comprehension course for students of Psychology and Education was completed, and materials from the course for students of Social Sciences were adapted for the online course offered to students from all disciplines. In addition, an InterWise group option was developed for the A-level reading comprehension courses for students of Humanities.

In the MA course in Education, "Curriculum Development and Implementation," a 3-day workshop on reading academic materials in English was added. On the lower levels, the development of materials for B, D and E level courses was completed. For the online B-level course, materials were rewritten and courseware was developed. Instruction in Arabic was added to the courseware for the online D-level course. Materials were rewritten for the workshop "Bridging the Gap in English," delivered online via InterWise.

Course development in Russian

New Russian translations were published in the following courses: "Midrash and Aggadah," "Ashkenazi Hasidism in the History of Jewish Thought," "Jews in an Era of Transition," and "National Security and Democracy in Israel."
