Graduates



In 2008-2009, 2,386 students obtained Bachelor's Degrees and 333 students obtained Master's Degrees. In addition, various diplomas, including 56 teaching certificates, were awarded to students completing a variety of study programs. Of those receiving a degree or diploma, 12% had no matriculation certificate.

Survey of All OUI Graduates

The Open University attaches great importance to feedback from graduates. Such feedback enables the OUI to learn from graduates' experience about the contribution of the academic degree to their personal, educational and professional lives. In the spring semester, questionnaires were sent to all OUI graduates (a total of 25,000 graduates). A response was received from about 25% of them

Main Findings

Career-related improvements: Of the respondents, 45% reported that they had received an increase in salary, 35% had advanced in rank, 33% had been promoted to a more senior position, 27% had benefited from an improvement in their terms of employment, 52% experienced an improvement in their social status and 82% reported improvement in their personal status.

Postgraduate studies: About 40% of the respondents reported that they had registered for graduate studies, most of them at universities in Israel. Of those continuing their studies, 41% were or had been at the OUI, 40% at other universities, 7% at universities abroad and 12% at Israeli colleges. The findings also show that 34% were studying for an MBA. In addition, 3.7% of the respondents were registered for doctorate programs and 71 of them had received their doctorates.

Russian Program Graduates

This year, the OUI awarded degrees (in Humanities and Social Sciences) to four students whose academic program had been held in Russian, one of them *summa cum laude*.

Graduates Who Started Studies as High School Pupils

This year, 68 students who had begun their studies while still in high school received a degree. Of these, 50 received Bachelor's degrees, and six received Master's degrees. 38 of these students completed their studies *cum laude* and seven *summa cum laude*.
