Undergraduate Students and Enrollments

This year, 43,118 students were enrolled in undergraduate courses. OUI students register each semester for a course (or some courses), rather than in departments.

"Course enrollment" refers to a student registered for one academic course. Thus, one student taking two courses is listed as two course enrollments, but only one "student."

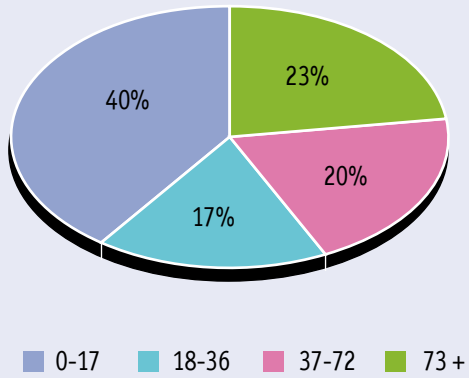
A "new student" is one who began studying in any of the semesters of this year (fall, spring, summer), and courses in which s/he enrolled are counted as "new student" enrollments throughout the year.

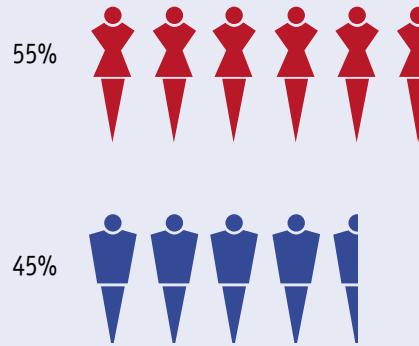

Undergraduate students, by number of credits *

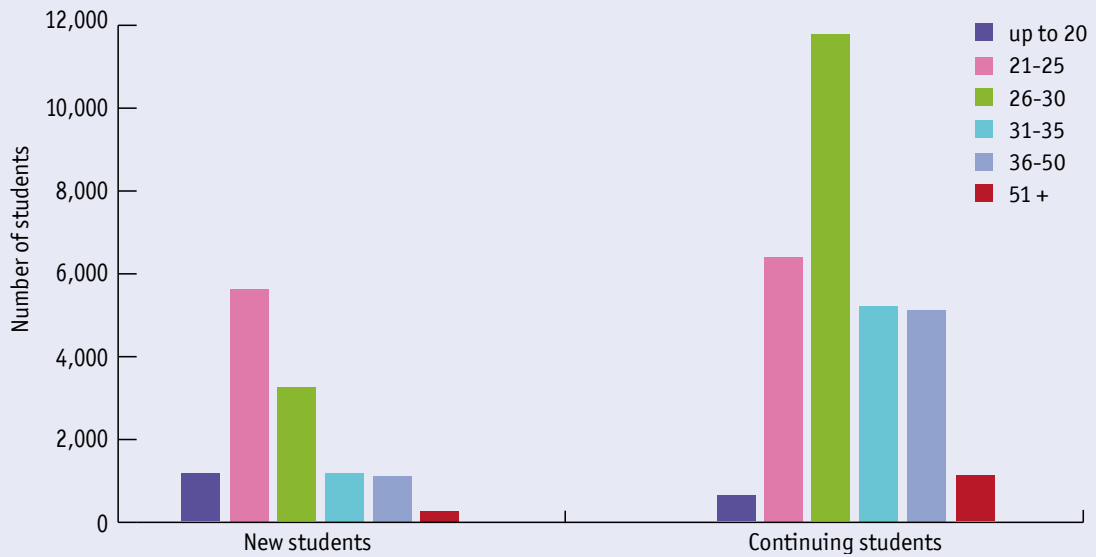

Graduate Students and Enrollments (including qualifying courses)

In 2009-2010, there were 3,665 graduate students, nine of whom were registered for more than one graduate degree. The total number of course enrollments was 10,933.

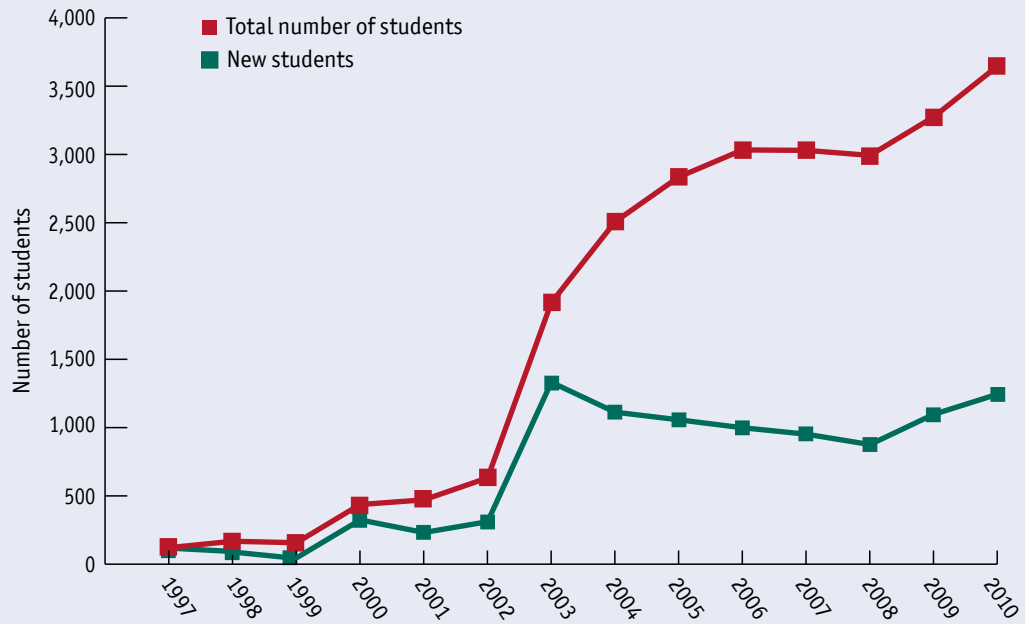
Since the OUI first offered graduate degrees, there has been a continuous rise in the number of students. The number of new students each year has remained relatively stable since 2003, while continuing students are increasingly persevering in their studies.

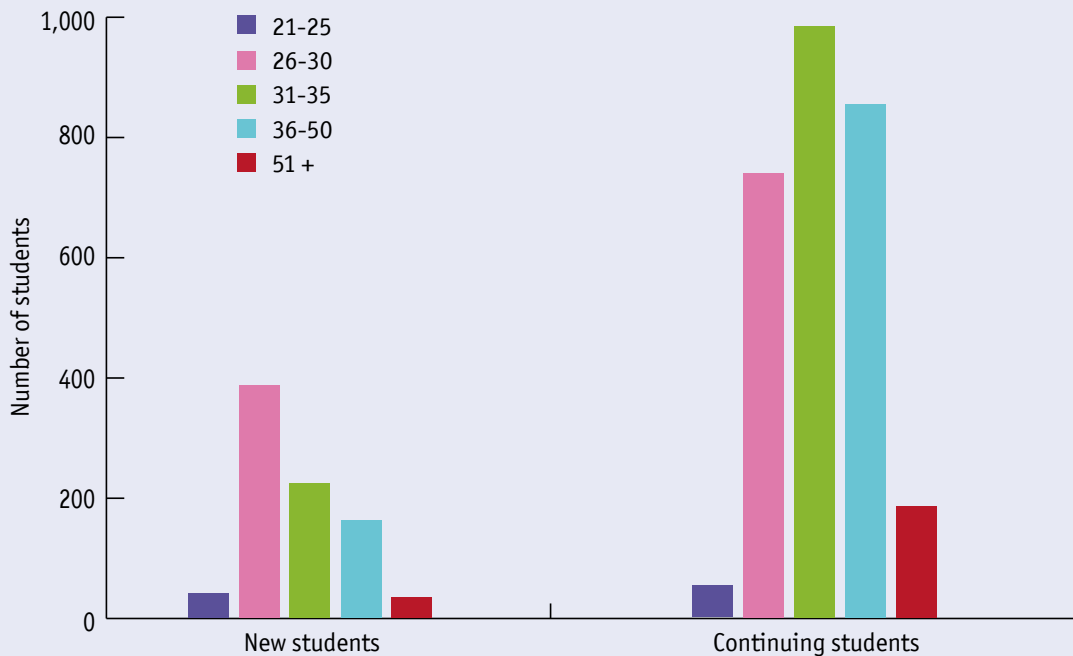
