# Pe'er, Opening the Treasures of the Mind

Through the *Pe'er* project, the Open University offers the knowledge-seeking general public free access to its study materials in electronic format. Most of the electronic books also include a full audio version to which users can listen on mobile players. Some courses include video lectures recorded at the OUI by the books' authors.

**Pe'er 2:** To expand the *Pe'er* project, this year, 19 new courses (59 separate volumes) were selected, of which nine books are already available on the *Pe'er* website, and another 17 are currently being digitized.
